

## **Protected Landmark Petition: Live Poultry Fresh Killed Sign**

#### **CULTURAL LANDSCAPE AND SIGNIFICANCE**

WHEREAS: The Mayflower Poultry shop, at 621 Cambridge St., is closing its doors after 89

years of business; and

WHEREAS The "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign, which was trademarked in 2005, is a major Cambridge

tourist attraction; and

WHEREAS This 6 foot tall sign has garnered such interest that the shop has used it to sell "Live Poultry

Fresh Killed" merchandise such as tee shirts and hats; and

WHEREAS This "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign is a famous East Cambridge Landmark, evoking the long

standing history of East Cambridge, and Cambridge more generally, in factory-produced butcher

products, and:

WHEREAS This "Live Poultry, Fresh Killed" sign appears prominently in such tourist-linked sites as YELP with

statements such as "I spotted this sign as I was moving in to Fulkerson street nearly a year ago, and I knew I had come to the right place. Not only is the sign for Mayflower hilarious, it also

proves to be an iconic landmark of East Cambridge;" and

WHEREAS Like the now landmarked "Shell Sign" and "EMF Sign," preservationists now recognize the

importance of preserving key parts of the history of our worker and emigre legacy as an

important piece of our community; and

WHEREAS As the neighborhood guide in <u>Boston Magazine</u> has noted, East Cambridge has had a vital role in

our City's diverse ethnic history: "Filled with industrial jobs, the neighborhood welcomed working-class residents, who spent their days on the factory lines. Immigrants from Portugal, Ireland, Italy, Lithuania, and Poland found their home base in East Cambridge, with their church

parish serving as a touchstone for their local ethnic community;" and

WHEREAS This same *Boston Magazine* article goes on to explain that, "By the 1960s, factories began to

shut down. Nearby, Kendall Square started its ascension into a technology stronghold, filling up with life sciences, pharmaceutical, and venture capital companies, bolstered by MIT just around the corner. Today, these companies continue to hold court in the area, as the neighborhood

works to coexist while maintaining its character in the face of change;"

WHEREAS We also read in this Boston Magazine article that "Some of the most beloved locales are fading

away....But there are still plenty of iconic spots going strong, ranging from fish markets and bakeries to Mayflower Poultry, with its "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign calling attention out

front;"

**WHEREAS** 

It is widely recognized that buildings can be repurposed, and maintaining important examples of the vernacular elements once broadly seen in East Cambridge and other neighborhoods in Cambridge is important to present and future generations, as well as visiting tourists, in conveying a distinctive and authentic picture of the neighborhood's history; and

WHEREAS:

**The** area in which this building is situated is rapidly undergoing change that risks depriving Cambridge of one of the most interesting of such important and historic work-and industrial-related structures to East Cambridge's identity, spirit of place, heritage, and cultural landscape; and

WHEREAS:

The "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign is inextricably linked to the history and culture of East Cambridge, and indeed the working class history of Cambridge itself; and

WHEREAS:

This specific sign is a vital and ongoing symbol of East Cambridge's environment of continual change and a key epicenter of this urban cultural landscape; and

WHEREAS:

The unique "LIVE POULTRY Fresh KILLED" lettering with its italicized and script-font "Fresh" and bold lettered "KILLED" on a white background, layered over an orangey yellow chicken image emblazoned on this sign displays the kind of eclectic and resonant mix of elements consistent with the one-time factory worker community and harkens back to the days when Cambridge specialized in blue-collar industries that supported the working class; and

**WHEREAS** 

Too much of this City's history is being lost or forgotten and some "have worried about Cambridge losing that blue-collar edge, because the blue-collar is where you get your grit. It may not always be pretty, but it is certainly tough with a can-do spirit, and much needed in crucial moments. I have also worried about Cambridge losing its "edge" in general. An edge created by the colorful, creative types who live life outside the parameters of a shiny new Cambridge built on "bio-this," "techy-that," and copious hipster endeavors" (Kristina Kehrer EMF Radio – An Oasis of Cool and Tradition in Cambridge on <a href="https://www.neighbormedia.org">www.neighbormedia.org</a>); and

#### **DESIGNATIONS**

WHEREAS:

The Cambridge City Council in 1983 enacted legislation designed to preserve and conserve buildings and sites of significance in Cambridge's history; and

### **CURRENT THREATS**

WHEREAS:

After the Mayflower Poultry shop closes, and their long term building at at 621 Cambridge St was sold, and the business itself relocated, the sign is anticipated to be auctioned off on August 26; and

WHEREAS:

The East Cambridge Neighborhood Conservation District Study Committee is now evaluating whether to create a Conservation District in this important part of the City; and

WHEREAS:

Cambridge citizens have complained publicly about the potential homogenization of architecture and use

#### LANDMARK DESIGNATIONS

WHEREAS:

The "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign at 621 Cambridge Street's design,

history, setting, and use make it worthy of preservation as a Cambridge Landmark; and

WHEREAS:

This sign at 621 Cambridge Street is one of a select number of properties that is important not only to Cambridge's economic and working class history but also its artistic vibrancy and indeed

to Cambridge as a whole; and

WHEREAS:

Protecting the "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign with local landmark status will enable its unique

qualities to be maintained for the benefit of all Cambridge and all Cantabridgians; and

WHEREAS:

Official landmark designation would "foster appropriate use and wider public

knowledge" of its distinctive characteristics and significance; and

WHEREAS:

Individually landmarking this locally significant structure is needed to ensure that public

participation and review guidelines contribute to the historic and visual enhancement of

East Cambridge for future generations; and

WHEREAS:

Notwithstanding the fact that the City of Cambridge has yet to afford official recognition

and protected status to the "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign at 621 Cambridge Street; so

THEREFORE do we, the undersigned residents of the City of Cambridge, pursuant to Ordinance 1002, Article III, Section 180(D) of Chapter 2.78 of the Cambridge Municipal Code, hereby respectfully pray that the Cambridge Historical Commission initiate with all possible haste the process of designating the "Live Poultry Fresh Killed" sign at 621 Cambridge Street as a protected landmark of the City of Cambridge.

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
