# Part I Total Crime

Like the temperature, serious crime in Cambridge continued to tumble downward over the first two months of 2014 when measured against the same time period in 2013, falling 27% with 117 fewer incidents reported. Compared against the five-year weighted average for this same time frame, a 33% decline (159 fewer Part 1 crimes below the projected average) was recorded. The majority of this decrease can be attributed to the overall drop in Larceny (-31%), with 99 fewer thefts counted when contrasted with the same time period in 2013. The fact that the mean temperature for January was 1.6 degrees below normal and February was 2.8 degrees under the average could possibly be responsible for driving large reductions in larceny from motor vehicles (-48%), thefts of bicycles (-63%), and larceny from persons (-35%).

A detailed analysis of all statistics indicates that there were 116 fewer property crimes noted for the first two months of 2014, which translates to a 30% decrease when measured against the 2013 statistics. Violent crime has dipped 2% over the first 60 days of 2014 with one fewer crime against the person reported than in the first two months of last year.

# Part I Property Crime

Property crime plummeted 30% beneath the number reported during the first two months of 2013 and recorded a 35% drop below the five-year average. The only property category to register a notable increase so far this year is auto thefts, with a rise of 40% (4 additional reports). Thirteen of the fifteen indexes associated with property crime are in the green (on the decline) so far in 2013. Larceny from MVs is one of the leading indicators, down 48% so far in 2013.

# Part I Violent Crime

- The projected 5-year weighted average for violent crime in Cambridge for the first two months of the year is 55 incidents. Through March 3<sup>rd</sup> of this year, there were 46 violent crimes recorded in the City, one crime below last year (-2%) and nine violent crimes under the total of 55 forecasted for this period (-16%).
- The first murder of the year occurred on February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2014. A complete synopsis of this incident can be found on the next slide. Meanwhile, reported rapes dropped by two incidents and aggravated assaults remained unchanged when compared with the first two months of 2013. The street robbery total of eight incidents is uncharacteristically low and may have resulted from the below-average temperatures curtailing pedestrian activity.

## MURDER

No Patterns

- The first murder of 2014 involved Malia Gomez, 40, of 396 Putnam Ave, who has been charged in the death of Dana Robinson, a 46-year-old Cambridge man, who police discovered unconscious with a chest wound on Gomez' Putnam Avenue porch on February 2nd. Gomez admitted to stabbing Robinson following an argument. Robinson died at Beth Israel Hospital and Gomez was charged with armed assault with the intent to murder, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, and assault and battery with a dangerous weapon causing serious bodily injury. Gomez was held without bail pending a psychiatric evaluation.
- 30 of the 36 murders in Cambridge since 1995 have been cleared by arrest or by the suicide of the perpetrator, which translates to an 83% clearance rate.
- The trial for Aislling Brady McCarthy is scheduled to take place in Middlesex Superior Court on April 7<sup>th</sup>, 2014. She is charged in the Janaury 2013 death of Rehma Sabir, who was taken to the hospital with severe head injuries on her first birthday. She died two days later.



## **Characteristics of Murder in Cambridge**

For the 30-year period between 1960 and 1989, the City of Cambridge averaged slightly less than five murders per year. The annual average since 1990 has fallen to approximately two per year. Trend analysis over recent years points to two recurring murder scenarios in Cambridge: domestic murder, in which one family member is brutally killed by another in a homicidal rage, and the murder of young males by a handgun or knife in acts of retaliatory street violence.

#### Cambridge Murder Statistics, 1990-2013

- 51 people murdered in 46 incidents (in 4 of the incidents, 2 or more people were killed)
- 32 victims were male (average age of 34)
- 19 victims were female (average age of 41)
- Most common weapons: handguns (23 incidents) and knives (11 incidents)
- 14 of the 46 cases are still under investigation or remain unsolved
- 20 of the 25 cases since 2000 have been cleared by arrest or by the death of the suspect, including all three murders in 2013



#### Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2014

Colin Burton, 30, of Dorchester, was shot and killed outside of Hi - Fi Pizza on Mass Ave in Central Square on September 18<sup>th</sup>, 1999. Burton was talking with the occupants of a Ford Explorer when the subject in the passenger seat fired through the window. Two suspects fled the scene. The case remains under active investigation.

lan Gray, 19, of Mattapan, was in an argument outside of the Rhythm & Spice restaurant that spilled out onto Mass Ave. A suspect that had left the scene retuned with a group of people and a fight ensued. A knife was produced during the altercation and four gunshots were fired, fatally wounding Gray. This case remains open.

On June 17<sup>th</sup>, 2002 at 7:00PM, Ricardo Williams, 27, of Malden, was found in the driver's seat of a motor vehicle suffering from a gunshot wound to his face. Williams was taken to CCH where he was pronounced dead. This case remains open.





#### Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2014

Jason Ellcock, 33, of Malden, formerly of Cambridge and father of three, was found with multiple gunshot wounds in front of the driveway to 364 Rindge Ave at 3:05 AM on the night of June 16<sup>th</sup>, 2009. He was pronounced dead at the scene. This incident remains under investigation.

James Lauture, 30, of Cambridge, was sitting in a vehicle near Brookline and Watson Streets just after midnight on Saturday, March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2011, when an unknown gunman opened fire. The occupants in the car were able to drive to Central Square. Lauture died from multiple gunshot wounds. The other man in the vehicle survived. This case remains open.

On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2012, **Charlene Holmes**, 16, of Cambridge was shot while sitting on a porch on Willow Street. She later succumbed to her wounds at the hospital. The investigation into this incident remains active, but no arrests have been made to date.

## RAPE

#### No Patterns

- All three of the rapes reported in 2014
   occurred during the month of January. There
   were no rapes recorded in Cambridge in
   February. Through this time in 2013, five rapes
   had been reported, equalling a 40% drop this
   year. In all of the 2014 rapes thus far, the
   assailant was an acquaintance of the victim.
- The following are the final statistics for Rape in Cambridge for last year: there were 17 rapes reported in Cambridge in 2013. During the previous year, there were 23 incidents, which translates to a 26% reduction from 2012 and a 23% decline when compared to the fiveyear average of 22 sexual assaults annually.
- The only stranger-to-stranger rape in 2013
  was recorded in March of last year. This
  incident involved a blitz type scenario late at
  night in Central Square. A Cambridge male
  has since been charged in this incident.
- Statistics released in October by the FBI reveal that rape decreased by .2% in the U.S. in 2012. The rate of forcible rapes in the U.S. in 2012 was estimated at 52.9 per 100,000 female inhabitants. The five-year average of rapes in Cambridge, a city of 106,000, is 22 incidents per year.



## ROBBERY

No Patterns

- The five-year average for overall robbery in Cambridge for the first two months of the year is 17 incidents. Over the first 8 weeks of 2014, 14 robberies were recorded, which translates to an 18% decline below the projected total.
- There were six commercial robberies in the first five weeks of 2014. That spree stopped on February 8th, with zero incidents reported since. Arrests were made in four of the six robberies. A number of regional, serial, commercial robberies at banks and convenience stores has been identified as a major problem in Greater Boston so far in 2014. The robbery at the Eastern Bank on Janaury 14th in Harvard Square was related to one of these patterns.
- The reduction in street robberies (-30% in 2013) continued over the first two months of 2014 with a 27% decline when compared to 2013 and a 43% drop when compared with the five-year average, with eight incidents recorded compared with the fourteen projected. The total of eight street robberies for the first two months is an uncharacteristically low number for Cambridge (the first 2 months of 2009 produced 30 street robberies). Less pedestrain traffic due to the exceptionally cold weather may be responsible for this decline.





## AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

No Patterns

- When compared to the first two months of 2013, the total of aggravated assaults this year remainded unchanged with 28 incidents reported in both time frames. When measuring this violent index crime against the five-year average for this time period, there has been a decline of 15%, with five incidents below the projected average of 33 assaults.
- One of the more significant statistics related to the final serious crime numbers in Cambridge in 2013 was the notable decline in aggravated assaults of 28% from the 2012 total and 27% below the fiveyear weighted average. The majority of this drop was attributable to a sharp decrease in domestic violence.



## Burglary

No Patterns

- Total burglary, the combination of residential and commercial burglary, is down 39% when compared to the five-year average, with 27 fewer incidents than the projected total of 69 crimes, and down 33% when compared with last year's total with 21 fewer burglaries reported.
- Commercial burglary remained unchanged with seven incidents reported during the first two months of both 2013 and 2014. When measured against the five-year average, a 36% reduction is revealed with four less crimes than the eleven projected for this time frame. There have been no commercial break patterns identified so far in 2014.
- Analysis of housebreak activity in Cambridge for the first eight weeks of 2014 indicates a 38% reduction (21 fewer breaks) than in 2013 and a 40% decline below the 5-year projected average of 58 housebeaks. One pattern has been identified so far in 2013, a sporadic series of daytime housebreaks in the neighbrohoods of Central Square.





## Housebreaks: 1.1.14 to 3.3.14

Analysis of housebreak activity in Cambridge for the first eight weeks of 2014 indicates a 38% reduction (21 fewer breaks) than in 2013 and a 40% decline below the 5-year projected average.





### LARCENY

**Continuing Pattern** 

- Continuing Pattern
- Overall, larceny through the first two months of 2014 has decreased by 31% when compared with the same time frame in 2013 and is also down 36% when measured against the five-year weighted average.
- Larcenies from motor vehicles are down 48% year-to-date when compared with the same time frame in 2013. Part of this difference is likely due to the cold and snowy weather we have seen all winter. LMVs dropped 9 incidents from 25 in Jan. to 16 in Feb. The current LMV problem spot is Cambridgeport.
- Larcenies from persons year-to-date in 2014 have registered 35% below the level reported during the this time in 2013, with 16 fewer incidents compared to last year and 20 below the five-year average of 50 incidents.
- There have been 51 larcenies from buildings reported citywide through the first two months of 2014. This total is 25 crimes (33%) below the number reported during this time frame in 2013 and 18 thefts (26%) below the five-year average. There are no patterns of this activity anywhere in Cambridge at the present time.
- Thus far in 2014, there have only been 6 bike thefts reported, which is 10 incidents (63%) below the total reported during this time frame in 2013 and 9 below the five-year average. This decrease is likely due to the exceptionally wintry weather over the past two months. Bike thefts reported this month were reported in Mid-Cambridge (2) and North Cambridge.



### LARCENY: From MVs


Sporadic Pattern

Larcenies from MVs are down 48% year-to-date through March 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2014, when compared with the same time frame in 2013. There have been 44 fewer thefts reported so far this year. This crime has also fallen 53% when measured against the five-year average, with 54 fewer incidents than the projected total of 102 thefts.

- This index crime dropped by nine incidents, or 36%, from January to February. LMVs decreased from 25 thefts last month to 16 this month.
- Thefts from unlocked vehicles are still occuring in Cambridgeport / Riverside, but at a slower rate than in the fall of 2013. However, this is still the hotspot area for the city this year. Incidents picked up in mid-January and continued sporadically throughout February. Incidents are occurring most often overnight on Monday into Tuesday and Friday into Saturday. Two-thirds of the involved vehicles have been unlocked at the times of the breaks. Electronics and loose change are the main targets.





# Larceny from Motor Vehicles What can we do?

#### **Police Response Strategy:**

- Cambridge Police are focused on prevention of these crimes by increasing officer visibility in targeted areas.
- Citizens are encouraged to take the proper precautions to protect their vehicles and their belongings by doing everything possible to not make their vehicles easy targets.



#### **Citizen Response Strategy:**

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their vehicles, and their belongings from theft:
  - Make sure all of your car doors are locked when you leave your vehicle.
  - Take extra care when out doing your shopping.
  - •If you are approached by a suspicious person while you are in your vehicle, sound your horn to attract attention.
  - NEVER LEAVE VALUABLES EXPOSED IN YOUR CAR.
    - If you must leave packages or valuables in your car, place them in the trunk of under a blanket to conceal them



- Larcenies from the person are down 16
  incidents (35%) through 3/3/14 when compared
  with the same time frame in 2013. The total of 30
  incidents reported thus far in 2014 is 20 incidents
  (40%) below the five-year average of 50.
- Larcenies from the person citywide dropped by one incident from January (15 thefts) to February (14 thefts). There are no patterns at the present time.
- Between January 23 and 26, five thefts of purses, cell phones, and a wallet were reported at late-night shows between 10pm and 2am at the Middle East in Central Square. No new incidents have been reported since January 26.
- Often, much of the larceny from person activity is reported at the many bars and restaurants in Harvard Square (known as "dipper" activity). In February, there were three incidents of this nature reported in Harvard Square, two in Central Square, and two at the food court in the Galleria Mall.



- There were only 3 bike thefts reported in January and another 3 in February. This total is 10 incidents below the total reported during this time frame in 2013 and 9 below the five-year average.
- Bike thefts stayed the same from January to February. As would be expected, both bike ridership and bike thefts are reduced with the cold and snowy weather. Only two neighborhoods had reported bike thefts this month: Mid-Cambridge and North Cambridge.
- Five of the six thefts reported this year involved bikes that were locked but left out in the open (locked to public bike racks, for example).

### **AUTO THEFT**

No Patterns

 The projected five—year weighted average for auto thefts after the first two months of the year is 14 and thus far we are right in line with this. However, in 2014, with 14 thefts year-to-date, we are seeing a sizeable increase from 2013 (up 40%).

- The four-week change is showing a large increase of 267% from January to February, as auto thefts have increased from 3 to 11 incidents.
- Since the beginning of the year, thefts have been reported in Agassiz, Area 4 (3), East Cambridge (2), Inman (2), Mid Cambridge (3), Riverside, and West Cambridge (2). There are no patterns at the current time.
- Year-to-date, four or 29% of the stolen motor vehicles have been recovered.
- In 2013, we ended the year with the lowest reported number of autos thefts ever recorded in Cambridge at 106.



# Local & Regional Increase in Heroin Overdoses

Massachusetts State Police recently reported that at least 185 people have died from heroin overdoses statewide in the last four months. This number does not include figures from Boston, Springfield, or Worcester, as they handle their own death investigations. Similar increases have been reported in other states as well.

One possible explanation for the increase in fatal overdoses is that the heroin may be cut with Fentanyl, a synthetic drug that increases heroin's toxicity.

Mirroring the statewide trend, Cambridge has also seen an increase in heroin overdoses and deaths this year. Through early March 2014, there have been 24 overdoses reported to Cambridge Police, 14 of which involved heroin. Two of those have been fatal. Through this time in 2013, only 17 overdoses had been reported, and of those, only 3 involved heroin and none were fatal.
