## **Updates**

- Earth Day at high school
  - Everyone shoveled soil gone by Monday morning, all weekend long, worked!
- Fix It Clinic
  - Dailey, Elka, Stephanie a lot of wins, also brainstormed for the future with written notes
- Need more volunteers for Zero Waste Master Plan Open House on June 12 at King Open School
  - Goals:
    - Answer questions & share facts about recycling, compost programs, etc.
    - Ask people's interests in improving waste-related programs
    - Get community involved in zero waste program process
    - (there will be an opportunity for people to share ideas even after the event)
  - Role of volunteers: hosts, guides (not pushing people toward any direction)
    - Not running small conversations
    - Guide people through this process
    - Fact sharing: compost disposal costs less, helps environment -> what do you think?
    - Come up to the board and share your thoughts!
  - Soon will be distributing flyers to inform the community

- There will be food!
- Post in Next Door
- Suggestions
  - Videotape as well as write down people's thoughts/ideas
  - Raffle off compost bags
- Sub-committee to work on letter with RAC suggestions to Commissioner Watkins
  - Commissioner to attend RAC meeting in June or Sept
  - Send letter by end of October
  - Chance to put in something more aspirational
  - Sub-committee composes the letter and asks the rest of RAC for feedback

## Move-Out

- Pilot with potential grant: Reduce and Reuse Grant from Mass DEP
  - For housewares, furniture?
  - Curbside pick-up model
  - Community fridge model
    - People can take stuff and drop off only for a period of move-out time (make it special)
    - Organize attendants check in from time to time
    - Try a pilot for a day or so
      - Somewhere convenient for those who walk and drive
      - Next to Helpsy bins
    - Pick 5 convenient spots
      - Labor Day weekend
  - Pod vs Curbside
    - Already tried curbside mattress, clothes, etc.
      - Curbside works ok if it gets scavenged but gets collected at the end
    - Pods are hard: dumping issues need to be managed
      - Where?
      - Buy-nothing solves it but only for people with access
      - "Free store" (vs swap) model worked
        - Why not pilot around housewares & clothes no furniture
        - Only one trash bagged at the end
        - CCC Gym worked, only one bag of trash at end
        - o Or King School?
          - Only available on the day of

- But before the semester begins, school is empty
- School is great: Helpsy bin is already there
- Parking issues to be resolved
- A lot of work by volunteers
  - Set up
  - Quality control
    - Need more staffing, planning, and system separating small from large items
    - In-take control with enough staff
  - Clean up
- People bring stuff that day
- Can the grant pay people to set up, sort, clean up?
  - Establish a model
  - Community service credit: high school students could be helpful
  - 2 ½ hours for volunteers
- 3-5 people came in with a massive amount of stuff & many others with a bag or two
- Population bringing is different from population taking in
  - Finally getting into the migrant population who really need stuff
  - One of the most compelling arguments for this model
- Can we do Fix It Clinic, Compost Give Away &
  Free Store at the same location at the same time?
  - Need to check our resource pool, may not have enough staff to run them all
  - Timing is important to capture the move-out
    - Looking at end of August
- Boomerang closing: location opportunity?
- Pod is better than "free store" one-off model: need a mechanism to cover a range of times that serve multiple move-outs in early May, mid-May, end of May, end of June, etc.
- Free-store sub-committee with DPW staff and RAC members
  - Helen, Emily, Scott, Tracie, Amy, Elka and Claire Davies (2013 RAC member)
  - Include a DPW member

- Find a location
  - High school?
  - Should be near the population in need
  - Fix It Clinic population is different from Free-Store population
- Condition now
  - Pickup is twice as long during the move-out time
- One-pager for outreach to residents
  - Message
    - Reuse instead of putting on curbside
    - Go look for the pod in your neighborhood if that's the plan
    - General vs detail
    - QR code linked to something Camilla already made
  - Look into Austin, Texas
    - Car parking more limited here than in other college towns
- Need to be ok to focus on one area for pilot
- Try a pilot and see what happens! (instead of continually talking about it)
- Plastic industry insights from Richard, at conference
  - A lot of support for recycling
  - PFAS issues to be resolved
  - UBQ reuse materials coming to Cambridge?!
