

MESSAGE FROM THE CITY MANAGER


Since the last edition of *The Cambridge Life*, a number of important events have occurred in the City that are worthy of mention. This issue highlights the various programs that serve local youth, including the good work of the City's five Youth Centers which contributed to Cambridge's selection as one of the 100 Best Communities for Youth for the second year in a row. I am pleased to report that King Open Preschool, one of six City-operated preschools operated by the Department of Human Services, recently became one of the first early childhood education programs in the nation, and the first in Cambridge, to earn accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children. The City's Youth Centers and Preschool programs go a long way toward building community and supporting neighborhood vitality.

In March, the City of Cambridge, in collaboration with the Cambridge Health Alliance and the Kendall Foundation, launched the Cambridge Energy Alliance, a \$100+ million energy conservation initiative that will provide financing and technical assistance for the installation of energy efficiency improvements and water conservation measures in residential, commercial and institutional buildings. This issue of *The Cambridge Life* also highlights the City's Urban Forest – what the City is doing to preserve it, and what we are urging our residents to do. Promoting a healthy environment by adopting sound stewardship and energy efficient practices is an important goal for the City. Learn more about what we are doing to protect the environment and how you can help.



PUTTING CAMBRIDGE YOUTH

FIRST PROGRAMS THAT DELIVER RESULTS FOR CAMBRIDGE PRE-TEENS AND TEENS

Being named one of the nation's 100 Best Communities for Children is a significant honor. Receiving that recognition two years in a row is a clear indication that in Cambridge, we put our youth first.

The Cambridge Youth Programs (CYP) represents five reasons Cambridge youth are so well-served. CYP incorporates five fully-equipped Youth Centers that offer diverse, high quality programs for young people, families and the entire community. The programs promote leadership and youth development through enrichment activities, unique experiences and opportunities to develop relationships with adults and peers.

PUTTING PRE-TEENS AT CENTER STAGE

Imagine an inspiring alternative to after-school television. What would it look like? Picture pre-teens learning the art of animation or debating community issues, and you'll begin to get the idea behind the CYP Pre-Teen After School Program.

While each Youth Center offers distinct programming. all offer homework assistance. healthy snacks, leadership development opportunities, sports leagues, arts, community service and enrichment activities. Some of the enriching opportunities include:

Youth Center Member **■ Community Meetings:** Youth and staff discuss upcoming events and community issues, providing an opportunity to share stories, ask questions, and provide entertainment

■ **Knowledge Bowl:** City-wide trivia competitions

with topics ranging from sports to geography and everything in between

- Babysitter's Club: Training in first aid, basic childcare skills, sanitation procedures and more - culminating in a babysitter's certificate
- **Karate:** Youth learn the basics of karate blocks, kicks, mental strength, self-control and basic sparring
- **Animation:** Youth develop a flip book, photograph it and use movie-making software to edit the resulting film into animated short films
- **Lego Robots:** Youth learn the basics of engineering by building robotic Lego projects

FOCUS ON TEENS

The CYP Teen Program has been redesigned with the input of Youth Center staff, program participants, community members and government representatives. The reinvigorated programs have been developed around three models

of youth development: Comprehensive,

Enrichment and Social Development. Comprehensive programs are small groups of youth working with adults and are focused on skill-building and developmental outcomes for youth.

The programs are often

work-based, but also include Youth Councils, service-learning or other project-based experiences. Enrichment programs introduce young people to new experiences, broadening their vision of themselves and the world through classes, workshops, field trips and guest speakers. Social Development offerings include activities that support positive peer/peer and peer/adult relationships and promote healthy lifestyles. Examples of program activities include:

- **City Peace:** Internships guide teens to explore issues of violence prevention, conflict resolution and mediation. Participants create a legacy project that speaks to violence prevention in Cambridge.
- **SHYNE:** Professional instructors offer 8-week courses identified by young people. Classes including belly dancing, the art of DJing, Driver's Education, cooking, boxing and creative writing introduce youth to hobbies, skills, or potential careers.
- **Athletic Leagues:** Teens compete in various athletic leagues between centers and with other community-based organizations.

CYP offers something for everyone. In addition to afterschoool care for preteens and programming teens, they also deliver top-notch community events for families – designed to encourage youth and families to participate in activities together. Ongoing activities include:

- Community dinners Speaker panels
- Parent groups Athletic tournaments

These safe, fun activities enable Cambridge youth to thrive and feel a sense of belonging – resulting in young adults who are ready for future employment, higher education, citizenship and adult life.



CAMBRIDGE ENERGY ALLIANCE

AN INNOVATIVE MODEL FOR ENERGY EFFICIENCY

On March 29, 2007, City Manager Robert W. Healy and Mayor Kenneth E. Reeves welcomed Governor Deval Patrick to Cambridge to officially launch a new, \$100 million energy efficiency initiative called the Cambridge Energy Alliance (CEA). This new non-profit organization, a collaboration between the City, the Henry P. Kendall Foundation and the Cambridge Health Alliance, will design, market, install and finance an unprecedented number of energy efficiency and water conservation measures in residential, commercial and institutional buildings, with the goal of substantially reducing local greenhouse gas emissions, peak hour electricity demand and use of fossil fuels.

INNOVATION AND COLLABORATION

Many aspects of the CEA are innovative: the collaboration between private foundations and city government; the opportunity to have direct impacts in the commercial, residential and institutional (university) sectors; the very substantial level of funding commitment – 80% – by the private sector, with the other 20% coming from electrical utility incentive programs; the widespread opportunities to "save money and the planet," in the program's tag line.

No City funds will be used to implement the program. In addition to raising funds from private investors, the program will take advantage of newly created funding sources for energy efficiency, including incentive payments for large-scale reduction in energy demand.

Also, by working with NSTAR, CEA can build upon and greatly expand the utility's existing conservation efforts, so more people can be served and greater energy savings obtained by each customer.

MEETING A NEED

The Alliance will perform several important functions including assisting businesses, residents and institutions in identifying energy efficiency opportunities; identifying qualified contractors to carry out the work;



and providing funding to pay for the improvements. Low interest loans will be available to fund some improvements, with repayment to come from documented energy savings.

A CITY AT THE FOREFRONT

Representatives from the Kendall Foundation noted that Cambridge is the ideal city for this first-of-a-kind energy alliance, a large-scale, cross-sector efficiency initiative. The City of Cambridge recognizes that climate change poses significant potential impacts and has already taken important steps to reduce emissions, including adopting an innovative Vehicle Trip Reduction Ordinance, creating the Climate Leaders Initiative, and making a commitment to build "green" public buildings, among other things.

At the kick-off event, City Manager Robert W. Healy also commented on the importance of the CEA by thanking the City's partners. "The Cambridge Energy Alliance will make the community a better place economically and environmentally," Healy said. "This is a very innovative approach that brings together unique financing, the latest in energy and building technology, and a broad outreach program that will allow us to reach a much larger number of households and businesses than past efforts."

According to Healy, this approach will enable the City to make big strides toward its goal to reduce global warming pollution and at the same time make Cambridge households, businesses and institutions more resilient against rising energy prices.

"I'm very pleased that the Kendall Foundation has chosen the City of Cambridge to be its partner in pioneering this new approach that we can share with other communities throughout the region and beyond," Healy concluded.

CITY TAKES STEPS TO SAVE MONEY AND THE PLANET

Taking to heart the theme of the
Cambridge Energy Alliance, "Saving Money
& the Planet," the City is taking a variety of
steps to reduce its own energy use.
The most visible is switching all the traffic
signals from the old-style incandescent
bulbs, with colored plastic covers,

to bulbs that use LED (light emitting diode) technology. If you look carefully at a traffic signal you can see that each new light is actually a lot of separate tiny lights clustered together. LED signals have many advantages. Because

they use much less

electricity than the old

incandescent lights, they save the City close to \$300,000 in electricity bills every year. They are brighter and last any times longer saving additional

many times longer, saving additional funds in replacement costs. LED signals are also safer because they burn out slowly, one diode at a time.

CAMBRIDGE RESIDENTS DO THEIR PART

Cambridge residents are doing their part to address climate change as well. Cycling in the city increased by 70% between 2002 and 2006. Walking continues to be popular. In fact, Cambridge has the highest percentage of residents who walk to work of any city over 40,000 in the United States, at 26%. Only New York City comes out ahead in the percentage of people who commute by means other than driving alone. Driving is a major cause of climate change, and every time we choose to go someplace by walking, cycling, or taking transit, we are taking a step away from global warming.


YOUR CAMBRIDGE POLICE DEPARTMENT

SERVING THE COMMUNITY WITH NEW TECHNOLOGY



The Cambridge Police Department (CPD) has always been committed to "providing the highest quality of police service and impacting crime." The department recently stepped up those efforts by unveiling a Web site designed to bring the power of "new crime prevention strategies" and "problemsolving partnerships" to the fight to keep Cambridge safe.

The new site is informative, easy to navigate, and – most significantly – interactive, giving Cantabrigians the opportunity to contribute to their own safety.

ON THE LOOKOUT

There are now two ways for Cambridge citizens to stay abreast of police alerts online. A link to active alerts is prominently listed in the "News & Events" section. These notices provide detailed information about incidents of note, including the neighborhood, methodology for the crime (as well as usual timeframe and a description of the activity), and any information available about suspects. The alerts also include suggestions for steps to

take to avoid the crime and steps to take should you witness suspicious activity matching the alert description. If you prefer to receive alerts via e-mail, click on the "Community Quick Links" section to register.

HELPFUL TIPS

Alert community members can be important allies in crime fighting. The CPD Web site offers an opportunity to report crime tips and suspicious activity via e-mail with the new "Anonymous Crime Tip E-Mail" link. In just a few short months, the link has already provided valuable leads which have received prompt follow-through from the department. The drug tip phone line, (617) 349–3359, has also been an effective crime fighting tool for some time. It's important to note that for a crime or suspicious activity in progress, the police request that you call 911 from telephones located in Cambridge or dial (617) 349–3300 from outside of the city.

A SAFE, SECURE WAY TO GET VALUABLES BACK

The CPD Web site hosts a link to Juststolen.net. This innovative tool was designed to easily register stolen assets in order to facilitate their recovery. Once an item is recovered, law enforcement agencies worldwide can search a database to identify the rightful owner. If your property is lost or stolen, visit the Web site, click on the "Juststolen.net" link, and submit your information via the user-friendly interface. There is even an option to browse recently recovered property that is currently in police custody or register your laptop so that authorities know how to contact you should they recover it in the future.

BE PART OF THE SOLUTION

Interested in helping your community every day? Have you considered a career with the Cambridge Police Department? Civil service tests for police officers are provided once a year in early spring (residency is required). While the department does not fill specific specialty positions from the new recruit officers, it is not unusual for new officers to be assigned to a variety of different functions – from Special Investigations to the Bomb Squad or Special Response Team. recognized for high quality and professionalism

"The new NAEYC accreditation system raises the bar for preschools, child care centers and other early childhood programs," said Mark Ginsberg, Ph.D., Executive Director of NAEYC. "King Open's NAEYC

accreditation is a sign that they are a leader in a national effort to invest in high-quality early childhood education and to help give all children a better start."

Since its establishment in 1985. NAEYC accreditation has become a widely recognized sign of high-quality early childhood education. Nationally, only 8 percent of all preschools and other early childhood programs are accredited.

Developing skills and learning-by-doing at the NAEYC-accredited King Open Preschool. While professionalism and high standards are always the order of the

day in Cambridge education, they are par-

ticularly crucial in the arena of early childhood education. So it is with great pride that the Cambridge Department of Human Service Programs (DHSP) has announced that King Open Preschool recently earned accreditation under new, stringent criteria implemented in 2006 by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) the nation's leading organization of early childhood professionals.

"We're proud to have earned the mark of quality from NAEYC and to be recognized for our commitment to reaching the highest professional standards," said Laura Stone, King Open Preschool Director. "NAEYC accreditation lets families in our community know that children in our program are getting the best care and early learning experiences possible."

MAKING THE GRADE

To earn accreditation in the new system, involved families joined the King Open Preschool staff – including director Laura Stone and teachers Saida Delgado, Patricia Rosser and Debbie Gordon – in an extensive self-study process. They measured the program and its

services against the 10 new NAEYC Early Childhood Program Standards and more than 400 related accreditation criteria. The Preschool Program received NAEYC accreditation after an on-site visit by assessors. Accredited programs are also subject to unannounced visits during their accreditation, which lasts for five years.

MEETING A HIGHER STANDARD

The new, stringent accreditation criteria reflect the latest research and best practices in early childhood education and development. These standards focus on:

- positive relationships for all children and staff
- development-centered curriculum
- effective teaching approaches for diverse populations
- ongoing assessments of a child's progress
- nutrition and health
- a safe and healthy physical environment
- maintaining collaborative relationships with each child's family

MORE GOOD NEWS

Cambridge is fortunate to have a number of early childhood programs including preschools and kindergartens accredited under an earlier process. Now DHSP's remaining preschools and Cambridge Public Schools' kindergartens are completing the new accreditation process and approval is anticipated in the near future.

Former Switch House Becomes Home for 55 First Time Buyers

SWITCH HOUSE

On June 19, 2007 a dedication was held to mark the renovation and conversion of a former NSTAR switch house in Riverside into 33 units of affordable homeownership housing. The handsome historic building, constructed in 1922, was part of a power plant that Harvard University purchased from NSTAR in 2002. As part of a comprehensive 2003 zoning agreement with the City, Harvard redeveloped the building as permanently affordable housing, which the City will sell to income-eligible first-time homeowners. The building consists of one, two and three-bedroom units.

The project includes surface parking for 33 cars and the site has been generously landscaped on the Putnam Avenue side to complete the new façade.

With its close proximity to the Charles River, many neighborhood parks, and neighborhood shopping, 33 families will be happy to call Riverside home beginning this fall. In addition, starting in September 2007, planning will begin on a new city park in Riverside, on land to be deeded to the City from

Based on the strong commitment of the City Council and the City administration, the City of Cambridge, working with the Affordable Housing Trust and its non-profit housing partners, has created over 2,800 affordable housing units since the end of rent control in 1995. Another 500 units of permanently affordable housing have been created since 1998 in private housing through the Inclusionary

Housing Program. Despite these impressive numbers, demand continues to be strong for affordable ownership and rental opportunities. For example, when 50 affordable units were marketed by the City in June, over 350 applications were received. Further, in the past year, over 700 families and individuals have been added to the database of those seeking affordable housing.

To keep up with this demand, the City has the following projects under way:



The non-profit Just-a-Start has converted a former commercial property and adjacent homes into 13 units of homeownership housing at 199 - 209 Columbia Street in the Area IV neighborhood. The existing historic homes were completely rehabilitated, along with the new construction component.

The project consists of six two-bedroom and seven three-bedroom units, all affordable to first-time homebuyers earning below 80% of area median income. Just-a-Start received over 100 applications for the 13 units. New owners should be moving in this fall.

NORTH CAMBRIDGE VFW

Construction is nearly complete on CASCAP Inc.'s Webster 5 Condominiums,

a nine-unit homeownership project on Massachusetts Avenue in North Cambridge. Built in the 1800's as a fire house, later used as a police sub-station and then a VFW hall, this historic building will now be home to nine low and moderate income first-time homebuyers. The exterior facade of this former City-owned property has been historically restored to reveal its handsome details. The site is just north of the Porter Square MBTA Station and the Porter Square Shopping Center, making it a very desirable location. Buyers will be selected and new owners are expected to move in by the end of 2007.

IN THE PIPELINE . . .

Harvard Street Print Shop

CASCAP Inc. plans to begin construction in 2008 on the Print Shop Condominiums, a new 24-unit homeownership project located on the corner of Harvard and Davis Streets. The new building will incorporate energy efficient features and green technologies with cutting edge design to create an exciting architectural addition to this part of the Area IV neighborhood. Located on the site of a former print shop, the development will be able to take advantage of its proximity to the new Harvard Street Park, which is to be completed in the fall of 2007.

823 Main Street

The former Nightstage property at 823 Main Street has stood vacant for over five years. Just-a-Start purchased the property in June 2007 and plans to construct 10 new units of homeownership housing. There will be eight two and three-bedroom triplexes and two one-bedroom flats on the ground level. All units will be sold to first-time homebuyers earning less than 80% of area median income. The reuse of this neglected site will contribute to the revitalization of the Main Street corridor.

WHAT IS THE URBAN FOREST?

The urban forest in Cambridge, as in most cities, is not defined as only a large area of woodlands. Rather, the urban forest is the collection of all the forest resources spread throughout the city- street and park trees, those on private property, and those at nature reservations such as Fresh Pond, Alewife Brook and the Charles River. Together, this collection of individual trees forms a valuable public resource.

WHY IS THE URBAN FOREST IMPORTANT?

Urban trees serve many important purposes, contributing to environmental health and overall quality of life in our community. A vibrant urban forest improves air and water quality, provides shade and cooling effects, reduces stormwater runoff and prevents flooding, provides wildlife habitat, and beautifies the landscape. All of these things have a positive impact on both public health and private

property values.



WHAT IS THE CITY DOING TO SUPPORT AND EXPAND THE URBAN FOREST?

Planting news trees
 Each year, the City's
 Department of Public Works

(DPW) plants an average of 300 trees through the tree planting program. The DPW also takes advantage of other opportunities to plant more trees, such as the new trees planted along Prospect Street using a State grant or on the 238 Broadway site as part of the park expansion.

2. Maintaining existing trees

All City street, park and cemetery trees are pruned on a regular maintenance cycle. The DPW also responds to additional service requests for pruning and the need for emergency removals.

3. Working with developers and contractors who impact trees

Recent efforts include enacting a tree protection ordinance that applies to large developments, negotiating for increased planting during other new development projects, requiring tree protection during public and private construction projects, and providing technical assistance to developers and contractors.

WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP THE URBAN FOREST?

1. "Adopt" street trees near your home

Take some time to weed and water trees in your neighborhood. Young trees especially need water to get off to a healthy start. One inch per week is all it takes (a little more during summer or times of serious drought).

2. Plant a new tree and care for it

If you are able to do so, plant a large tree on your property and water it. If you have an empty tree well outside your property that you would like to see filled, or would like to find out about opportunities for new trees at the back-of-sidewalk, please contact the Parks and Urban Forestry Division at (617) 349-4885 or cambridgetree@cambridgema.gov. Please be advised that most tree planting is done during

spring and fall and most requests for public tree planting are filled during the following season.

3. Be a good steward of the urban forest

Please teach others about the importance of trees in Cambridge. Report sick, injured, or vandalized trees to the Forestry Division. You can also help out by organizing a neighborhood clean-up. Call the DPW at (617) 349-4846 to learn more.



Cambridge Political System Plan E Form of Government - Proportional Representation

The City of Cambridge is governed by the Plan E form of Government. Nine City Councillors and six School Committee members are elected at large every two years under the Proportional Representation (PR) system, which allows voters to vote for as many candidates as they wish, but they must indicate their order of preference among those candidates by numbering each choice. Once elected, the City Council then elects a Mayor and a Vice Mayor.

The Mayor chairs the City Council and School Committee and serves as the City's political leader. The City Council appoints a City Manager to serve as the City's Chief Executive Officer.






