I am pleased to report that the City of Cambridge has gained local and na-

tional recognition in a variety of areas.

Prevention magazine named Cambridge the Best Walking City in America. Popular Science magazine ranked Cambridge the sixth greenest city in the U.S. For the ninth consecutive year, the City maintained its three Triple A ratings from the nation's three major credit rating agencies. This is the highest rating that can be awarded to a municipality. Cambridge also received the Mass. Municipal Association Innovation Award for its partnership to reduce Greenhouse Gas emissions through the creation of the Cambridge Energy Alliance.

Additionally, Common Cause Massachusetts presented Cambridge with the 2008 E-Government Award in recognition of its commitment to open government by posting all key government records on its Web site. For the third consecutive year, Cambridge was named as one of the 100 Best Communities for Young People by America's Promise - the Alliance for Youth. The Cambridge Prevention Coalition, a division of the Department of Human Services Programs, won a National Exemplary Award for its Innovative Substance Abuse Programs. The Community Development Department's Lead Safe Program was also awarded \$770,000 from the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development to continue its important program to remove lead paint from Cambridge residences.

Police Department Launches Cambridge Alert Network and Youth/Family Services Unit


The Cambridge Police Department recently launched The Cambridge Alert Network, a new interactive way to keep the community connected and informed through optional e-mail or text message public safety alerts. The new initiative will also enable the public to report suspicious activities easily through the Text-A-Tip program.

Interested persons can sign up for The Cambridge Alert Network via a dedicated Web page link on the Police Department Web site, www.cambridgepolice.org. Subscribers can receive alerts via e-mail or as a text message to their cell phone. Options include citywide, neighborhood specific or business type alerts, as well as alerts from other cities. The "Text-A-Tip" program will enable the public to submit anonymous tips to the Police Department about suspicious activity via text mes-

Cambridge Named Best Walking City in America



Cambridge was recently awarded the Best Walking City in America by Prevention magazine with more residents walking to work (26%) and more parks per square mile than any other city in the country. Prevention magazine and the American Podiatric Medical Association annually team up to measure the walkability of America's cities as interest in walking for fitness remains strong. Cambridge also has the second highest percentage of non-automobile commuters (56%, after New York City at 65%). In addition, bicycle commuting in the city has increased by 70% since 2002. While its size, density and compact land use give Cambridge a natural advantage, the rapid growth in bicy-

cling and walking can also be traced to the City's long-standing focus on making it easier for people to walk, bike and take transit.

Cambridge Named 6th Greenest City

The February issue of *Popular Science* magazine ranked Cambridge the **sixth** greenest city in the U.S. Rankings were based on raw data from U.S. Census Bureau and National Geographic Society's Green Guide, which collected survey data and government statistics for American Cities over 100,000 people in more than 30 categories, including air quality, electricity use and transportation habits.

City to Open Two New Parks

Comprehensive renovations to the Father Callanan Playground at the John M. Tobin School began in 2007 and will be completed this spring. The refurbished park features a new play structure for school age children and swings near the school building, a new separate and enclosed play area for children 5 years old and under on the nearby section of field, a new hard court play area featuring a full basketball court where the former playground was located along Concord Avenue, marked paved areas suitable for other hard surface play, and two half basketball courts. This summer, Costa Lopez Taylor Park in East Cambridge will be renovated and expanded by incorporating a parcel of land donated to the city at the corner of Lopez Avenue and Charles Street. The new space was designed with input from area residents and the East Cambridge Planning Team. It will include a sitting area with tables, chairs, benches, plantings and other decorative features, as well as about 37 community gardening plots in above-ground planting beds. The plots will be assigned and managed through the Cambridge Conservation Commission's community gardening program. The design also integrates a sculpture by artist Roberley Bell. 823 Main Street **Just A Start Corporation**

Construction to Begin on Two Green Affordable Condominium Developments in Area Four

Construction will begin this spring on Just A Start's 10-unit condominium development on Main Street and Cascap's 24-unit condominium development on Harvard Street.

Both projects are smart-growth developments and will feature green building materials and sustainable features. Each will be among the first in the state to receive funding through the Massachusetts Department of Housing and Community Development's new Green Affordable Housing Initiative. This funding will be used to install photovoltaic panels to significantly reduce utility costs for future homeowners and will help create a model of green building in Cambridge.

823 Main Street, Just A Start Corporation

For more than 10 years, the former Nightstage nightclub stood vacant on the corner of Main and Cherry Streets. Ten new condominium units will be constructed that will be affordable to first-time homebuyers. The project will include one, two and three-bedroom condos.

The project will create family housing close to transportation, jobs, schools and shops. The addition of these new homeownership units will add to the vibrant mix of residential, commercial and retail along Main Street and the surrounding neighborhood.

125 Harvard Street, Cascap



Located on the site of a former printing facility, Cascap's Harvard Street development will transform an unused industrial site into 24 new condominium units that will be affordable to first-time homebuy-

ers. The units will range in size from one to three bedrooms and will include energy efficient materials and fixtures.

This particular site is an ideal location for new housing, given its proximity to public transportation and the recently expanded Harvard Street park, which is only one block away.

War Memorial to Re-Open Fall 2008

The War Memorial facility at 1640 Cambridge Street will re-open this fall after an extensive renovation. Cambridge Recreation will be offering new programs and activities for children and adults, including a week of classes and activities offered at no cost to introduce teachers, staff and coaches. The synchronized team will demonstrate and perform routines. Tennis, yoga, agua aerobics and swim instruction will be offered, along with life conditioning, karate and more. BE CLEAN & GREEN during Spring Cleaning Projects



When Cleaning Indoors:

- Dispose of chemicals properly
- 2008 Household Hazardous Waste Collection: June 21 & Oct. 25, 9 am- 1 pm, 450 Concord Ave. Accepted materials: www.cambridgema.gov/recycle
- Dispose of compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs) properly
- Replacing four standard bulbs with CFLs reduces your electric bill by more than \$100 over the life of the bulbs and prevents 5,000 pounds of greenhouse gas emissions. CFLs contain mercury and must be properly disposed.

Local stores that accept CFLs for recycling: Dickson Brothers, Economy Hardware. Inman Square Hardware. Masse Hardware. Tags Ace Hardware and Whole Foods on River St. CFLs are also accepted at the Cambridge Recycling Drop-off Center, 147 Hampshire Street during open hours (Tues/Thurs 4-7:30 pm & Sat 9-4 pm) and at household hazardous waste collection days (see above).

When Cleaning Outdoors:

- Rain showers eventually flow into the Charles River and Alewife Brook Follow these tips to help protect our local waterways:
 - Only water goes down the drain! Don't wash anything (chemicals, sand, debris, leaves) into a storm drain.
 - Storm drains protect us from flooding be sure to keep them clear.
 - Reduce runoff from yards: seed or mulch bare spots to keep topsoil from eroding and reduce the use of fertilizer (instead, compost your grass clippings or leave them on the lawn as fertilizer). If you must fertilize, test your soil first and use the minimum necessary.
- Reduce hard surfaces in yard and plant trees, shrubs and groundcover to help rain water soak into the ground.
- Use rain water in the garden, either by collecting in a rain barrel or by directing downspouts toward planted areas. Contact DPW about purchasing a rain barrel to capture runoff from your roof.
- Guard against rodents by reducing yard waste and rubbish
 - Clean up debris and vard waste. Yard waste is collected curbside on recvcling day, either loose in barrels marked with red City stickers or in paper refuse bags. Yard waste in plastic bags is not accepted.
 - Clean rubbish storage areas regularly.
 - Store rubbish and yard waste in covered rodent resistant barrels.
- New Leaf Blower Ordinance
 - In response to the community's desire to balance the benefits and drawbacks of leaf blowers, the Cambridge City Council enacted an ordinance (Cambridge Municipal Code Section 8.16.081, effective Mar. 1, 2008) that governs the operation of this equipment. Ordinance highlights include:

Leaf blowers must meet current EPA emissions standards and the sound they emit cannot exceed 65 decibels (per manufacturer's rating).

Dates Permitted: Mar. 15 – June 15 & Sept. 15 – Dec. 31 Dates Prohibited: Jan. 1 - Mar. 14 & June 16 - Sept. 14;

All Sundays and Legal holidays, except Columbus & Veterans' Days Hours of Use: (during permitted dates) Mon – Fri: 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

Sat: 9 a.m. – 5 p.m.

Columbus Day: Noon – 5 p.m. Veterans' Day: 1 –5 p.m.

Reports of violations should be directed to the License Commission (during City office hours) at 617-349-6140, or to the Police Department (after hours) at 617-349-3300.





Prince Hall Memorial Project

Cambridge is honored to serve as the location for a new Memorial monument recognizing the achievements of the first civil rights leader in America, Prince Hall, who also had a rich history of contributions to the City of Cambridge. This monument will serve as a testament to all Black patriots of the revolutionary period that helped lay the foundation for this nation.

The proposal for a monument on the Cambridge Common was presented by then City Councillor E. Denise Simmons (currently serving as Mayor of Cambridge) on September 12, 2005 (Prince Hall's birthday). The nine members of the Cambridge City Council agreed unanimously. A Prince Hall Memorial Committee was recently established to review Artist proposals for the project and select a suitable site on or around the Cambridge Common.

Prince Hall is best known as the founder of the first Black Masonic Lodge in the U.S. in 1776. He also organized the first school for Black children in 1797, led the fight for adult literacy and personally assisted in the education of many adults. Prince Hall fought for the abolition of slavery and was heavily involved in the rights of slaves and ex-slaves in the Cambridge/Boston area. He had a Methodist mission in Cambridge and was well acquainted with the Black people (almost all slaves and servants) who resided in our city. Today, there are some 300,000 masons who follow the good work of their founder, Prince Hall. There are 47 Grand Lodges and thousands of Lodges that answer to the name Prince Hall, including Mt. Moriah Lodge #9 of Cambridge. For more information, call 617-349-4321.

Energy Smackdown™ Community Reality Contest

By the time you receive this newsletter, the City of Cambridge would have kicked off its participation in **The Energy Smackdown,™** an innovative community outreach program to increase energy efficiency and reduce carbon emissions. The program challenges and supports participating individuals, households and organizations to reduce their own energy consumption as well as the energy consumption of others in their community. In doing so, participants engage the public on the critical issue of climate change and what citizens can to do to reduce carbon emissions. The Brainshift Foundation, in cooperation with National Grid, the Kendall Foundation, NSTAR, Northeast Energy Efficiency Partnerships, the Massachusetts Climate Action Network and the Cities of Arlington, Cambridge and Medford has recruited 10 households to compete in a 12-month community-based reality contest to see which community can make the biggest energy reduction. Will My Analog TV Still Work in 2009

On February 17, 2009, television stations across the nation will cease broadcasting via analog signals and only use digital signals. If you have an older television without a digital tuner built in and receive your broadcast signal "over the air" and not from a Cable TV or satellite provider, your screen will go blank on that day. The Cambridge Consumers' Council is working to educate consumers about their options to ensure no one is misled into buying a new TV or level of cable service they don't need. The Federal Government has authorized a program that will allow households to receive up to two coupons, each worth \$40 that can be presented to various retail stores selling electronics in exchange for a special converter box that can easily be connected to your analog television to enable it to receive a digital signal. Depending on their preferences, consumers may have to supplement the \$40 coupon, though it is quite possible one or more brands of converter boxes will sell for around that price, plus applicable sales tax! saging. While this is not a replacement for dialing 911 in an emergency, this technology will allow interested persons to communicate potentially helpful information. Users must send the text message to CRIMES (274637). The text message must start with "Tip650" followed by the message. Tip650 is a specific code that has been assigned to Cambridge. When police receive the message, they can respond via text message to the tipster, who will have a randomly assigned ID number. The Cambridge Police Department will not maintain information about the identity of the individual reporting the information.

New Family Unit Takes Hands-On Approach

In response to increasing community concerns over youth violence in recent years, the Cambridge Police Department has created a new Youth and Family Services Unit that is expected to go above and beyond the role of the traditional Juvenile Unit.

"This is part of a department-wide effort to begin shifting our focus from crime to people," explained Commissioner Robert C. Haas. "We want to go above and beyond just solving crimes. We especially want to intervene early when feasible and interact more with youth and families to help resolve potential problems and get them back to a place of well being."

Lieutenant Leonard DiPietro, who will lead the new unit, further pointed out how vulnerable youth can be and hopes that this more direct approach from the Police Department will make a greater difference and provide a positive reinforcement for troubled teens. The unit will have 5 School Resource Officers who will be aetting more involved with kids after school and at the City's teen centers. Cambridge Police are working with several community partners, including the Department of Human Service Programs, Cambridge Prevention Coalition, Cambridge Public Schools, Cambridge Health Alliance, Clerk of the Courts Office, District Attorney's Office and the Salvation Army, to offer alcohol and substance abuse counseling, mental health support and various other specialty services.



Façade Improvement Program Lends a Helping Hand

The City's Façade Improvement Program provides matching grants of up to \$35,000 for the funding of well-designed improvements that coordinate all the important features of a storefront into a more attractive image. This may include the restoration of architectural details and installation of energy efficient storefront systems, accessible entrances, well-proportioned signage, energy efficient lighting and attractive awnings. Since its inception, the program has provided design services to over 125 business and property owners and helped finance 73 façade or signage and lighting improvement projects throughout the city.

One such business that took advantage of the program was the Clear Conscience Café at 581 Massachusetts Avenue in Central Square. Conceptual designs provided by the program's consultant. Elizabeth Palmer Architecture, illustrated how the storefront could look with a new storefront system, awning, light fixtures and threedimensional signage. Palmer was hired by the new café owners, Daniel Goldstein and Jack Kutner, to combine the exterior design with their interior plans, creating a beautiful and inviting space where organic, fair trade coffee and goods are served in a sustainable built environment. General contractor Marc Truant & Associates of Cambridge brought the concept to fruition. Emergency Preparedness for Persons with Disabilities



Men's Health Initiative Launches in Cambridge

Men who team up with a friend can join a 10-week fitness league in which participants commit to being physically active twice a week with a partner. Healthy Children Task Force Wins National Award

At a March ceremony, Mayor E. Denise Simmons honored the Healthy Children Task Force for winning an Innovation in Prevention Award from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The national award recognizes the group's success in promoting nutrition, physical activity and healthy weight among Cambridge public school children. Since 2004, an increasing proportion of Cambridge students are in the "healthy weight" category and passing standard fitness tests. The task force is a local coalition of public health professionals, educators, researchers, civic leaders and parents.

Volunteers Needed for Medical Reserve Corps

The Public Health Department is seeking volunteers for a regional Medical Reserve Corps that would help out during major emergencies and assist with routine public health activities. Nurses, doctors, pharmacists, public health workers, allied health professionals, social workers and interpreters are currently being recruited. People without medical training are also needed for a variety of tasks. Volunteers receive free training on topics such as first aid, CPR and preparing your family for emergencies.
